La Habra JROTC Visit

On October 17th, USC's Naval ROTC had the honor of welcoming cadets from La Habra High School's NJROTC unit. Our goal for the day was to offer these students a comprehensive look into the life and opportunities within NROTC and to strengthen the bond between our institutions.

After the students showed up at USC, we kicked it off with a tour of the USC campus. The tour started at the PED, where most NROTC events take place, moved to Trousdale, and then to the Alumni House to show important parts of USC history. The group was then introduced to the freshman dorms including New North and Birnkrant as well as the two big libraries: Leavey and Doheny. The students also got to see the amazing views of the School of Cinematic Arts and the Viterbi School of Engineering. By showing cadets many different parts of campus we were able to illustrate the balance of military discipline with academic pursuits that NROTC students at USC enjoy. Fall 2023 Marine FEX

On the 21st of October, motivated Marine midshipmen rose early and mustered in the wardroom at 0330. The bright and early morning started with a trip to Camp Pendleton for the 2023 Fall FEX (Field Training Exercise). This training event, conducted alongside UCLA midshipmen, was the final evolution to demonstrate the hard work over that the past few weeks. In the weeks prior to FEX, Marine Option midshipmen learned skills that would prove to be paramount for the training evolution, including land navigation, fireteam and squad formations, basic weapons handling, and receiving and briefing orders.

Upon arriving at Camp Pendleton, midshipmen conducted dynamic warmups and were issued rifles before embarking on a 6 mile hike, with the final destination being the station for conducting LRCs (Leadership Reaction Course). Midshipmen from both units rotated between stations and alternated fireteam leaders, receiving and giving orders in order to complete the creative and demanding task laid out in the LRC.

Directly following the LRCs, midshipmen were sent out in buddy pairs to complete a land navigation course; the ideal end state was to have located each of the ten given points in the two hour allotment. Midshipmen used their acquired knowledge of compasses, terrain, azimuths, and land navigation to trek for two hours, going from point to point.

After completion of the land navigation course, midshipmen were broken up into fireteams and completed SULEs (Small Unit Leadership Evaluations). These mock scenarios were meant to gauge a fire team leader's ability to lead under fire. For each SULE, the fire team of that scenario received an order, modified it, and briefed it to his fireteam.

The cumulative event of the FEX was a squad SULE in which all of the midshipmen joined and participated. The squad SULE, more grand in its nature, was the ultimate cumulative assessment of all that the midshipmen had learned. Upon completion of the squad SULE, the midshipmen hiked back to their starting point and conducted a debrief led by Capt. Gabel and MIDN 1/C Trodden.

I am exceptionally grateful to have been afforded the opportunity to take part in the Fall 2023 FEX. The classes taught by the upper class midshipmen were instrumental in performing well at FEX, and their instruction was top notch. Attending the FEX reaffirmed my desire to work to commission as an officer in the U.S. Marine Corps.
