In a celebration of commitment, dedication, and the fulfillment of a significant chapter in their lives, Midshipmen (MIDN) Kott and Gallo have officially commissioned as Ensigns (ENS) in the United States Navy. The commissioning ceremony, held inside the PED entrance, and the end of their years at the University of Southern California's Naval Reserve Officer Training Corps (NROTC), was a poignant event that resonated deeply with all who attended.

As the attending guests took their seats, Colonel Juarez began his speech celebrating the journey of the two midshipmen and the opportunity that will follow, bestowing words of advice and wisdom to be kept close to their hearts. The Oath of Office was then delivered promptly thereafter to the two midshipmen and was followed then by a changing of cover insignia, as assisted by family, from the NROTC Midshipman emblem to that of a U.S. Naval Officer's. The two were then greeted with their first salutes; ENS Kott's being MIDN Jensen and Ensign Gallo's being MIDN Harrison. After the ceremony, Colonel Hull (USMC Retired), the President of the USC's NROTC Alumni League, welcomed the two to the league as new members as many smiles were shared.

As fellow midshipmen who shared the arduous journey with Ensigns Kott and Gallo, the prevailing sentiment was one of excitement and pride. "Excited," said one midshipman, capturing the anticipation in the air. Expressed by a midshipman who was inspired by the commissioning, they themselves cannot wait to "have my family witness me and my best friends stepping into a big career and enter naval service." The ceremony was inspiring to all who attended and as they set off into their new roles in the Navy, the two new Ensigns leave us with words of advice:
