NJROTC Area 11 "Super Bowl" Competition

On February 11th, Midshipmen from the Trojan Battalion volunteered at the NJROTC Area 11 "Super Bowl" Competition held at Santa Ana High School. The top NJROTC units from the Area 11 region (California/Arizona) competed at the "Super Bowl" in order to secure a spot at the National Championships in Pensacola, FL. Twenty-one Los Angeles Consortium Midshipmen, MECEPs, and Active-Duty staff volunteered by judging and scoring color guard, unarmed and armed basic drill, unarmed and armed exhibition drill, personnel inspections, PT events, and academic tests. It is noted that our Midshipmen's repeated interactions with Area 11 NJROTC units has influenced recent increases in college and NROTC applications from these units. Several current Midshipmen in the Trojan Battalion were part of the NJROTC program back in high school.

Retired Lieutenant Brad Snyder, USN, spoke about taking advantage of circumstances and how when one door closes, another opens. We also heard from the League of Wives, who shared their story of ambition and perseverance in getting their husbands, and other POWs, home from Vietnam. It was a powerful insight into how dedication to a cause can bring about change. One of the highlights was when three POWs gave a vivid account of their survival as POWs during the Vietnam War for 7-8 years. There were many other lessons learned, but these were some of the standout moments.
